

# ADVENT?????

The four key themes of Advent, often represented by candles on an Advent wreath, are Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love, guiding Christians through spiritual preparation for Christmas by reflecting on the arrival of Jesus. Each week focuses on one of these virtues, building anticipation and deeper meaning for Christ's birth, with the candles typically lit sequentially, often in purple and pink/rose colors.



# Here's a breakdown of the four themes:

#### 1. **Hope**:

The first week focuses on the hope for the coming Messiah, represented by prophecy and expectation.

#### 2. Peace:

The second week emphasizes finding peace in God's promise, often linked to the angels' message.

#### 3. <u>Joy</u>:

The third week celebrates the joy of the approaching birth (Gaudete Sunday), sometimes using a pink candle.

#### 4. **Love**:

The final week culminates in the greatest virtue, love, reflecting God's love in sending Jesus.

These themes prepare hearts to receive Jesus, with some traditions adding a central "Christ Candle" lit on Christmas Eve for purity and light.

#### "THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT", DECEMBER 14, 2025

#### FROM THE PASTORS DESK

"JOHN HEARD IN PRISON WHAT JESUS WAS DOING AND SENT FRIENDS TO INQUIRE OF JESUS HIS PURPOSE. JESUS REPLIED, "TELL JOHN WHAT YOU SEE AND HEAR."

By this time in Matthew's story about John the Baptist, his public preaching had cast shame on Herod's wife, who once was married to Herod's brother. His public judgment about their current "situation" shamed Herod's wife who wanted her husband to have John executed, but Herod's conscience stayed his hand and he kept putting the terrible consequence off.

The palace of the Jewish tetrarch of Galilee (a son of Herod the Great who was a puppet king beholding to the Romans) included a prison where the "junior" Herod had detained the Baptist. In his prison cell, John had been hearing tidbits of news from back home in Galilee about his cousin, Jesus of Nazareth and is baffled by what he hears. It seems Jesus doesn't meet John's expectations. He expected a Messiah who would impose himself with the terrible force of the judgment of God, saving those who accepted his baptism and condemning those who rejected it. Just who is this Jesus? Wanting to clear any doubts he had about Jesus, he sent disciples to inquire about Jesus' true identity: "Are you the One who was to come or should we expect another?" The question was decisive in those early days of Christianity. Jesus' response wasn't theoretical but very practical and precise:

"Go back to John and report what you see and hear." They ask for his identity and Jesus responds with his healing work, his serving the sick, the poor and the unfortunate people he finds in the villages of Galilee, without resources or hope for a better life. "The blind see, the lame walk, lepers are cured, the deaf hear, the dead are raised and good news is given to the poor." To know Jesus, it is best to see whom he approaches and what he loves to do. To understand his identity, it's not enough to acknowledge theoretically that he is Messiah, Lord and Son of God. One must identify with that way of being the Messiah, which is nothing less than to relieve suffering, to heal lives, and open a horizon of hope for the poor.

Jesus knows that his answer may disappoint those who yearn for a powerful Messiah, a judge who condemn human beings. So, he adds, "Happy are those who do not feel let down by me." Do not expect another Messiah to act differently; let no one invent another Christ more to his/her liking, because the Son was sent to make life more dignified and happy for everyone, something that will be fulfilled completely in the final feast of the Father.

Which Messiah do we Christians follow today? Do we love to do the things that Jesus did? And if we do not do these things, just what are we doing in the midst of the world? What are people "seeing and hearing" in the church of Jesus? What do they see in our lives? What do they hear in our words?

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments- Bullying is defined as any unwanted aggressive behavior by another youth or group of youths that involves an observed or perceived power imbalance and is repeated multiple times or is highly likely to be repeated. 20% of youth ages 12-18 experience bullying. When adults respond quickly to bullying behavior, they send the message that bullying is not acceptable. There are ways parents can make a positive difference. Parents

can educate themselves on the signs that a child is being bullied or is a bully. Parents should keep the lines of communication open with their child and model for their child how to treat others.
