

"EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME" AUGUST 10, 2025 FROM THE PASTORS DESK

"Sounds a lot like Advent." That's what I thought to myself when I read the gospel passage for this weekend. BE PREPARED! How prepared ought we to be? Some of us check the flashlight once in a while, some freshen up on CPR, AED when we get a chance (like we did here a couple years ago), or how to start a fire without one of those monstrous Bic clickers. Beyond that we take our chances.

It's the bad news we often can't predict that throws us. The plant is moving to Asia; a new-born has Type 1 diabetes; Mom is dying at 53. Those who sit around and speculate about every bruise or ache they feel – they're not exactly healthy, either, but we hear more about it. Life teaches us that it is a vital maneuver to know when surrendering the desire to control the ungovernable future is inescapable.

Jesus talks about it as "a thief in the night" to remind us that some crucial events in our lives are not invited or especially welcome. Loss, illness or death are among the forms the thief can take, just as the Second Coming and the Reign of God might.

When Christ tells the disciples to be prepared, it has nothing to do with planning our escape route or emptying the ATM at the bank. All we need to carry with us is a peace blessing, which will be returned to us in homes that refuse to receive it in the proper spirit.


On the other hand, Jesus doesn't subscribe to the "Whatever" gospel when urged to put our trust in God. If we build on sand, we'll lose everything unlike those others who built on rock. If the welfare of our sisters and brothers escaped our attention we may find we've missed every chance to honor our Lord come Judgment Day. He tells the disciples to interpret the signs accurately so that when he asks them to pray with him in the garden, they'll have the grace to endure what's coming.

Today, our credit cards substitute for everything; we can keep moving and spending until our prodigal behavior catches up to us. So, why not strive for the credit card with no expiration date, no limit or monthly payment? A surprise and miraculous resource is available to those who give alms. Best of all, a thief can't get at it.

An inexhaustible treasure is ours and all we have to do is open our hands and let go of everything. That includes anxiety about our net worth, our security, the grip we have on those who "belong." In other words, our private plans for invincibility.

Where does our heart go when it's free to roam? That's where our treasure is, and as soon as we locate it, compare it to our allegiance to the Lord. No one serves two masters, so whichever allegiance is greater, that's our true religion.

FAMILY PERSPECTIVE


