



FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Today's feast doesn't often fall on a weekend, and when it does, we attempt to make a big liturgical deal about it. But first, some history.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross traces its origins to 4th century Jerusalem. Tradition tells us that St. Helena; mother of the emperor Constantine took a pilgrimage to the Holy Land in 326 AD where she discovered the cross upon which Christ was crucified. Many legends are attached to this story – one reports she found three crosses buried together near where Mt. Calvary was outside the walls of ancient Jerusalem. In an effort to authenticate which of the three was the "true cross," she proposed a test. Three recently buried people were located and each of the three crosses were applied to the deceased bodies. Nothing happened to the first two; but when the third cross was laid upon the third person, he revived.

To honor this discovery and mark the sacred sites of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection, Constantine ordered the construction of the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher the holiest site in all Christendom. The church was consecrated on September 13, 335, and the next day, September 14, the cross was publicly displayed for veneration. By the 7th century, this was an annual celebration, observed by both Western (Roman) and Eastern (Orthodox) Churches.

The capital punishment of crucifixion was abolished across the Roman Empire when Constantine made Christianity the religion of the Empire and the cross became the universal symbol of the Christian faith, a paradoxical symbol of salvation and suffering.

In today's gospel, a conversation between Nicodemus and Jesus centers around transformation, and it is saturated with symbolic meaning. Nicodemus, a Pharisee and teacher of the Mosaic (Moses') Law, comes to Jesu by night – a gesture reflecting both secrecy and the spiritual searching of one who is still in darkness. But he is drawn towards the light he sees in Jesus and cannot ignore the "signs" that Jesus performs. 'No one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.'

Jesus patiently leads Nicodemus thru the description of the work of the Spirit, whose movements are as mysterious and free as the wind that blows where it will — and certainly not under our control. Their dialog fades as the testimony of the early church is heard: "We testify to what we have seen." Their witness is to Christ. A striking story from the Book of Numbers is recalled: when the Israelites, weary and rebellious in the desert trek, are afflicted by poisonous serpents, and God instructs Moses to make a bronze serpent and mount it on a pole. Those who look upon it are healed.

The parallel is drawn – the Son of Man (Jesus) must also be lifted up so that all who believe in him might have eternal life. Here the image of "lifting up" brings together death on the cross with being raised and glorified. In John's gospel, the Cross is not only seen as a place of suffering and death but also a revelation of love and eternal life.

Lastly, the reading from Paul's letter to the Phillipians shows how Christ, though divine, empties himself taking the form of a slave and embracing death. And this complete self-giving is the path to exaltation!

To gaze on the cross is to behold a God who suffers with us — in our difficulties in relationships, with friends and relatives alike, when we feel depleted, sad, wounded and aimless. Whether in our eighties or teens or anywhere in between, we have a partner in our distress, who though exalted, will never leave us alone
