

# FROM THE PASTORS DESK

"There was a wedding at Cana.... and Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding."

#### The Last Rifleman

For Artie Crawford, the war never ended. Artie served as a rifleman with an Irish Infantry unit during World War II. He was just 16 years old – and petrified. He survived the invasion of France on D-Day only because of the street smarts and pluck of his best friend Charlie. Then one horrible day, while pulling Artie to safety, Charlie stepped on a land mine. The grief and guilt haunted Artie for the rest of his life. In the film *The Last Rifleman*, Pierce Bronson plays Artie at 92 years old and residing in a Belfast senior care facility. Maggie, his wife of 68 years, has just died. He suffers from PTSD, constantly reliving the deaths of his comrades. On television he learns about the 75th anniversary ceremonies marking D-Day in Normandy. Artie resolves to go, despite his age, his long list of health challenges, his expired passport, and the strenuous objections of his caregivers. But Artie sneaks out of his Belfast residence with a small suitcase and a pocketful of Euros.

Along the way, he experiences the kindness of strangers who are touched by his story and go out of their way to help, including the truck driver who gets Artie to the ferry to France in time and the single mom of two who smuggles Artie across the Channel in her trailer. The kindness of those who help him along the way gives Artie a new perspective on humanity as he wrestles with the pain of his past.

In France, he meets a one-time German soldier, who expresses his remorse for the actions of Nazi soldiers during the war. At first, Artie cannot withhold his anger, but as the German veteran shares his story, Artie's attitude begins to soften. Artie also meets a one-time American GI who recounts as he helplessly watched his younger brother being killed during the D-Day landing. Their experiences helped Artie understand that he is not alone in his remorse and doubt. They were all boys then, thrown into a maelstrom not of their making. Without giving away too much of the film, Artie finds Charlie's grave at Normandy and is able to pay his respects to his friend – and the war finally begins to come to an end for Artie Crawford, the "last" surviving rifleman of his Ulster unit.

In this movie, Artie dares to confront the demons of war that have haunted his adulthood. His odyssey to Normandy is his own version of the gospel story of the miracle at Cana, in which he discovers the "new wine" of forgiveness and mercy, of hope restored and compassion rediscovered. The writer of the Fourth Gospel calls the water into wine miracle the "first sign" of Jesus' ministry. Perhaps a fitting sign of what Jesus has been sent into the world to do – transform the world from brokenness and self-centeredness into God's banquet table of generosity, healing and hope. It becomes a place where the watered-down wine of fear is replaced with the exquisite wine of gratitude for the life God has given us.
