FROM THE PASTORS DESK

"Perhaps the giveaway moment back in March 2013 after one day (four ballots) and one ballot the next day hinted that the consensus came about quickly in the process of electing Benedict XVI's successor, Cardinal Gorge Bergoglio of Argentina. And no one may have been more surprised than he. The previous election of Cardinal Ratzinger in 2005 took a couple more rounds of ballots, and there was widely dispensed information that Bergoglio was the runner-up then. This time was different. He was the first pope to take the name of the popular medieval saint (Francis of Assisi), the first from the Global South and the first Jesuit. The key to understanding his time as the Bishop of Rome came as we unpacked the significance of his selected name. It's all about the poor.

Evidence of the presence of fellow Argentinians exploded in cheers of people waving the blue and white flag of their countryman under the bright lights of St. Peter's Square, luckily made brighter by the world's media equipment. Then he spoke.

"Fratelli e sorelli, buona sera – Brothers and sisters, good evening."

That was new! That's not the way a new pope had ever addressed the crowd in the square. Too familial. Too informal. Too common. Introducing himself not as the unapproachable Sovereign Pontiff but as a brother, indicating that fraternity rather than formality might characterize the theme of his service to his worldwide flock. He seemed to be more pastor than prophet, and, we would find, more intent on channeling mercy than preaching dogma.

Michael Winters wrote in the NCR about that moment, looking forward, "Francis would be seen as a turning point, a confirmation that the center of gravity in global Catholicism has moved south of the Equator."

In addition to sponsoring more than a couple Division I basketball teams in the NCAA, Jesuit colleges/universities are known for the scholarship of their faculties, and Professor Bergoglio was no slouch in that department. But as good teachers and loving parents know, memorable lessons are better taught by gestures than by bibliographies. And he did that in spades!

Early on, riding around that square, he asked the popemobile to stop so he could get down to meet a man he spotted on the rope line horribly disfigured by disease for his entire life. Francis makes his way toward him, the man tried to drop to his knees and his Argentinian brother reaches down to lift him up so he might embrace, hug and kiss him. His first overseas trip was not far – an island off the coast of Italy named Lampedusa, a site where poorly made boats of African and Arab refugees crash and sink, leaving scores of displaced people floating dead in the sea. His seemingly ceaseless and repeated efforts on behalf of the marginalized in whatever country he visited underscored his choice of the man from Assisi as his spiritual helpmate. We might recall that when he visited the United States to be the only pope to speak to a joint session of Congress, he went

immediately from that political cathedral to an enormous tent, having declined dinner with our representatives in order to serve hundreds of Washington's hungry poor.

Francis had a knack for engaging children, Winters wrote. On a parish visit in Italy, a young boy named Emanuele went to the microphone to pose a question to the pope, but the boy seemed overwhelmed with tears. Francis beckoned him – "Vieni, vieni" – and embraced him for a long time. The little boy whispered his question to the pope. He wanted to know if his father, who was an atheist and recently died, had gone to heaven. The pope assured the boy that God does not abandon a good man. Francis was able in that snippet not only to embody our dogmatic belief in the dignity of every human person, but before he shared the boy's story, he said, "If only we could cry like Emanuele when we have pain in our hearts." The pope pointed out how even a little boy's tears can humanize us and in a way evangelize us. He also noted that he had asked Emanuele's permission to share the story with his gathered neighborhood. A profound mark of respect for the boy's dignity. My hope for the future is that the process of synodality – which had a firm position in the early church - will be a force, an energy to create numerous arenas for members of the Body of Christ to accompany each other, speak freely, prayerfully listen in response and not feel threatened by the process. Let's pray that the next Bishop of Rome is unafraid.
