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



The First Sunday of Advent in 2025 falls on **November 30** and marks the beginning of the Christian liturgical year and a season of expectant preparation for the coming of Jesus Christ. The primary meaning of this day and the entire season is a dual focus on celebrating Christ's birth at Christmas and anticipating his second coming at the end of time.

Key Meanings and Themes

The First Sunday of Advent is characterized by several key themes and traditions:

- **Hope:** The primary theme for the first week is hope. The first purple candle of the Advent wreath, often called the "Prophet's Candle," is lit to symbolize the hope of the Israelites for the coming Messiah, and the hope of Christians for Christ's return.
- **Preparation and Watchfulness:** Scripture readings for this Sunday, such as those from Matthew 24, emphasize the need for spiritual vigilance and preparation, urging believers to "stay awake" and be ready for the Lord's unexpected return.
- **A New Beginning:** Advent Sunday is the start of a new Church year, offering an opportunity for spiritual renewal and a fresh start in faith and discipleship.

- **Repentance and Reflection:** The liturgical color for Advent is typically violet or purple, symbolizing prayer, penance, and reflection to prepare one's heart and mind for Christ's arrival, similar to a "little Lent".

Traditions and Practices

Common ways that Christians observe the First Sunday of Advent include:

- **Lighting the Advent Wreath:** Families and churches light the first of four candles on the Advent Wreath. The circular shape of the wreath represents God's unending love and eternal life.
- **Special Readings and Prayers:** Services often feature specific Old Testament prophecies (especially from Isaiah) and New Testament readings that focus on the themes of hope and watchfulness.
- **Advent Calendars:** Many families use Advent calendars to count down the days to Christmas, often with small treats or scripture verses behind each door, as a fun way to build anticipation.
- **Acts of Kindness and Charity:** The season encourages engaging in good works and giving to those in need, embodying the love and care that Jesus taught.

Ultimately, the First Sunday of Advent invites believers to pause amidst the holiday rush, reflect on their faith, and prepare their hearts for the profound mystery of God's arrival in the person of Jesus Christ.

FIRST WEEK OF ADVENT

FROM THE PASTORS DESK

“THEREFORE, KEEP WATCH...BE READY!”

One day the dramatic story of humanity will end, as life inevitably ends for each one of us. The Gospels mention a discourse of Jesus on the end of things, and they always highlight his warning to be watchful, to be alert, to stay awake. The first generations of Christians gave great importance to this watchfulness. As the end of the world did not come as quickly as some expected, they saw the risk of slowly forgetting Jesus and did not want him to find them asleep one day.

Since then many centuries have passed. How do Christians live today? Are we awake or have we slowly gone to sleep? Are we deeply attracted to Jesus or are we distracted by all sorts of side issues? Do we follow him or have we learned how to live like the rest of the world? To watch is first and foremost to awaken from unawareness. We have an illusion of being Christian, when in fact, quite often our interests, attitudes and way of living are not those of Jesus. This illusion shields us from seeking our personal conversion and that of the church. Without “awakening,” we will continue deceiving ourselves.

To watch is to live with the awareness of reality; to listen to the groaning of those who suffer; to know the love of God for life; to live more in touch with his coming into our lives, into our

society, into this world of ours.

Without this sort of sensitivity, it is not possible to follow in the footsteps of Jesus.

We live immune to the challenges of the gospel. We do have hearts, but our arteries have hardened. We have open ears, but we do not hear what Jesus heard. We have eyes wide open, but we do not see life as Jesus saw it; we do not see people as Jesus saw them. Could what Jesus wanted to avoid happen among his disciples? Are they/we seen like “the blind leading the blind?”

If we do not awaken, could it happen that we too would ask with those people at the last judgment who in the parable said, “Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or naked, a stranger, sick or in prison and did not help you?”
